SCOUT ACTIVITIES - CAMPS

TROOP WEEKEND CAMP - 9th/11th JANUARY 1970

OPERATION 'FIR TREE'

This camp took place at Broadstone Warren in the Ashdown Forest where we had booked the Training Hut, a large, well equipped building. The attendance was not as good as at the camp in November, when we had 29 Scouts, but this was probably due, in part, to the weather forecast.

We eventually left H.Q. on the Friday night in pouring rain, with 19 Scouts and two Scouters. Bosun and Buzz. Skip joined us later the following day.

Saturday dawned grey and wet but, being incurable optimists, we thought that the rain was a little lighter than the day before! Consequently, we breakfasted quickly and, after a quick clean up and inspection, we began briefing for Operation "Fir Tree". The general idea was that the Patrol Leaders and Scouters would act as "Enemy", whilst the 4 patrols under the Assistant P.L.'s were dropped at scattered points about ten miles from Broadstone. There was a background story that the Scouts were saboteurs, parachuted into the area to blow up a heavy water plant at Broadstone. During the morning they had to find their way by map and compass to a rendezvous with "local partisans" who would feed them and give them the "explosives" to carry out their mission. The patrols would then attempt to break into the Broadstone camp during the afternoon, evading the guards and sentries, to carry out their dirty deed!

In the event, three of the four patrols arrived at the lunchtime rendezvous, some of them rather wet and bedraggled, and were duly fed with hot soup, etc. At this stage it was still raining fairly hard, and a light mist was beginning to form on the high ground, so we decided to call the operation off. The three patrols were therefore transported back to camp to change and dry off, whilst the "partisans" waited for the fourth patrol who eventually turned up at 5.0 p.m., 1½ hours late.

Saturday evening was spent in the training hut surrounded by clothes spread out to dry under the gas heaters, and a certain amount of test work followed by various forms of organised horse-play took place.

Sunday dawned a little brighter, but still raining, and after the usual preliminaries of breakfast, inspection and flag break, we held a short Scouts Own Service. This was followed by a mock court in which one of the Patrol Leaders was accused of sheep stealing. The Judge, in the form of Skip, sat on his Bench, bewigged and armed with a felling axe, ready to behead the prisoner if found guilty. Fortunately he was found not-guilty by the rather boisterous jury, due to an excellent defence and rather unco-ordinated evidence from the prosecution.

After lunch a somewhat shortened version of the second stage of Operation 'Fir Tree' took place, when the patrols started at the perimeter fence of the camp, and tried to "blow up" the heavy water plant (alias the Tree House) with small fireworks. The Swifts were first home after eluding the guards and planting their explosives effectively, quickly followed by the other patrols, but not before some of them had been caught by the defenders.

Soon after this we broke camp, cleared up, and motored home, arriving at H.Q. about 4. 30 p.m. tired but happy!
