OPENING OF ANOTHER CUB PACK — THE PANTHERS!

The third Cub Pack of the Group was started on the 10th April, meeting on Mondays before the Scout Troop. It consists of 12 boys, all new to Scouting, run by Mrs. Christine Wheeler, assisted by her son, Venture Scout Philip, and Mitzi Patrick, sister of Brian who is in the Troop. Mitzi will be remembered in her bikini at our last Fete selling raffle tickets and she is an ex-Orpington Carnival Queen. On leaving school Mitzi hopes to train as an infants teacher and we hope she enjoys her time with the Pack and finds the experience useful in her future career.

In 6 weeks the boys have been transformed into a disciplined Pack, learning the meaning of unfamiliar things such as the *Grand Howl, Flag Break* and *Pack! Pack! Pack!*, as well as the most important aspect of Scouting, their Law and Promise.

Our first outing was the visit to the 9th Orpington Cub Headquarters for the European Pack Meeting when 8 boys attended in spite of the Cup Final.

As a new Pack we attended our first Church Parade in uniform on Whit-Sunday and all the Pack expect to attend the District Cub Adventure Day at Downe on the 17th June, and the Cub Open Day at Gilwell Park on the 1st July. Two of the three boys old enough to go to Boulogne on the 3rd June joined Akela and her family, with the Lions and Leopards, for the day — more news of this in later issues.

CUB DAY TRIP TO BOULOGNE



SCOUT REPORT

During the year the troop has engaged in a variety of activities.

The summer camp was held during the last week in July, at Corpusty, in Norfolk. Buzz and five of the boys went down a week prior to the camp to clear the site of nettles, and make it possible to pitch tents there.

SCOUTS TODAY

May 1972

In the United Kingdom today there are over half-a-million Scouts and more than 11,300 Scout Groups.

They are catered for in three main training sections; Cub Scouts for boys aged 8 - 11 years; Scouts (age 11 - 16; Venture Scouts 16 - 20).

The range of activities open to Scouts is an ever increasing one. As well as 'traditional' pursuits such as camping, hiking and first-aid, Scouts now take part in such interests as rock-climbing, gliding, caving, ski-ing, amateur radio, movie making and even parachuting. Community service and the "good turn" are still an important part of the Scout way of life.

International friendship is kept alive by the many thousands of Scouts who go abroad from this country and foreign Scouts who come here. Well over 10,000 British Scouts and Venture Scouts visit scores of different countries every year.

The Scout Association now has three national activity centres; Whernside Manor near Dent in West Yorkshire, where the first youth caving centre has been established, Lasham near Alton, Hants, for air activities including gliding and Longridge at Marlow, Bucks, for boating and canoeing. A fourth is in preparation for mountain activities.

Ultimate goal for every Scout is the coveted Queens Scout Award with its emphasis on service to the community and physical and mental fitness. The Queen's Scout Award, with its halfway stage the Venture Award, forms the basis of the training programme in the Venture Scout section. Britain's Scouts also take part in the Duke of Edinburgh's Award Scheme.

AROUND THE WORLD - CANADA

Most people know a few facts about Canada.... it's big, it's cold and it's British. After spending eight years there I can enlarge slightly on these points it's vast, it's unbelieveably cold, and its nationality is debatable.

Canada is the largest country in the world, and we saw only a very small part of it. However, distance means very much less there. We thought nothing of driving to Toronto, some 350 miles to the theatre, or to do some shopping — down in the morning, spend the afternoon in the city, and back that evening.

That it is cold is an understatement. In Northern Ontario in the winter, there are between 30 and 60 degrees of frost all the time. In late April when the thermometer begins to read above zero (farenheit) it feels almost warm. However, it's not only the cold, but what has to be done in it getting up two hours before leaving for work at least three times a week just to dig your car out of the drive (most frustrating when, having just finished, the snowplough comes along and deposits a six foot high wall of snow at the end). Mothers with babies are housebound because it is dangerous to take babies out. A hole in your gloves means frostbite within half an hour.

Winter sports are of course a big feature. Every winter, local ski schools are held for youngsters from three years old. Boys learn to skate long before going to school, and join midget ice hockey teams at five. Curling is very popular too, as are sledging and snowshoeing.

Canada is British; at least its a member of the Commonwealth. It's also part of North America, and economically tightly tied to the United States. Although Canada has been a nation for a century, and many of the 'natives' are third or fourth generation Canadians, it is rare to find anyone describing themselves as 'Canadian'. There are Poles, Italians, French, German, Yugoslav and Chinese, English and Scots — but no Canadians! What's more the Italians speak Italian, the French, French and so on. The Scots community speak Gaelic, and run evening courses for the unfortunate Scots who are 'rusty' in their native tongue, as do the Welsh, the Serbo-Croats and anyone else who can find someone toteach them.

This conglomerate has many advantages, for Canada must be one of the nations richest in cultures of almost every other country in the world, and even a few which aren't. They call it the Land of Opportunity, but surely there are opportunities everywhere. There are more things in life than automatic washers, dryers and deep freezers. Canada is a long way from home, and it's a very different way of life.



In January we welcomed Peter Grant and David Howlet to replace two Cubs who left.


